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## Why Jonah?

## The History of Jonah.

There is discussion that the prophet Jonah wrote this book during the reign of Jeroboam II between 785 and 750 B.C. Nineveh was the Capital City controlled by the Assyrians and they were pagan worshippers. The King had restored to the children of Israel the right to worship their God Jehovah. He also had begun to destroy some of the Assyrian's pagan gods. Assyria was known as a cruel ruthless and evil Nation. They were increasingly demanding and declaring their right to worship their way. They frequently invaded and pillaged the homeland of the Israelites. Jonah viewed them as evil, ruthless, cruel people not deserving to be saved.
